Course Description	<p>This course provides an introduction to European integration process and development of the European Union (EU) from the historical, political, legal and socio-economic perspectives. It examines the main EU institutions and the basic legal aspects of European integration. Moreover, this course provides insights regarding the policy-making process at the EU level, as well as it offers an overview of the main theories and concepts applied in the analysis of European integration. Correspondingly, the course enables students to develop critical understanding of the major current issues concerning the European Union.</p>

Differentiate the roles and functions of the main EU institutions; 3. Comprehend basic legal aspects of European integration and interpret founding EU treaties; 4. Present and debate major current issues concerning the European Union.</p>
